ABOUT FRED N. WIGHTMAN



Fred N. Wightman was an alumnus of Tulsa Public Schools, graduating from Central High School in 1964. He gave back to his alma mater and to the greater Tulsa community by serving for nearly three decades as a biology teacher at Central High School. Throughout his life, Fred was a true educator, and served as a mentor to students, friends, and family. During his tenure at Central, he taught and imparted to his students a lifelong love and appreciation for the environment and the natural world. As a teacher, Fred would often take his students on outdoor excursions to expose and connect them to nature and the environment. This Fund was established to honor Fred's memory and to continue his commitment to public education and his legacy of ecological stewardship.





DISTRICT-WIDE INITIATIVES

CAREER TECH/FAB LAB

Tulsa Public Schools provides courses and pathways through Career Tech Education consistent with industry standards. Exploratory courses begin in the seventh grade to teach students job readiness and skills, which can lead to employment and postsecondary education. The College and Career team supports educators to expand their professional development through the creation of a hands-on learning fab lab through a grant from Rotary Club of Tulsa. This lab houses 3D printers, virtual reality equipment and curriculum, glow forge supplies and more allowing educators to create a in-depth learning opportunity for our career tech students.

CONCURRENT ENROLLMENT

We are dedicated to making concurrent enrollment accessible to all high school students. Through the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education high school tuition waiver and Tulsa Public Schools underwriting of textbooks and course materials costs, our students can enroll in college credit hours if they can afford the course fees. Through the generosity of Assistance League Tulsa, qualifying concurrent students are awarded a scholarship to cover the course fees, making obtaining college credit hours possible for many of our students.

CONSTRUCTION PROGRAM

At Nathan Hale High School, the construction program is designed to be a pathway into high-wage job opportunities in the construction industry. There is a high demand for specialized jobs within the construction industry and students can earn up to 10 industry certifications. Supported by the generosity of the Home Builders Association, the Hardesty Family Foundation, and Hilti, students can learn problem-solving and critical thinking skills and utilize real world applications for math and science.

TENNIS COMPLEX

In 2021, Tulsa voters approved the Tulsa Public Schools Bond Package allowing the District to make needed improvements to many of its sites. One of those projects included the Booker T. Washington High School S.E. Williams Tennis Stadium. Thanks to two generous donors who together provided \$750,000, Booker T. Washington held a ribbon cutting celebration this spring. The additional philanthropic support allowed this project to be even better and bolder than what the bond funding allowed. The stadium includes four lighted tennis courts, dressing rooms, parking spaces, restrooms, and a concession stand. This investment will transform not only BTW's tennis efforts, but Tulsa's and Northeastern Oklahoma's tennis community as well!



EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION

Equitable access to excellent early childhood education is a priority for us. The early childhood programs, supported by the Birth through Eight Strategy for Tulsa of the George Kaiser Family Foundation prepare students for long-term academic success and to realize their potential to become healthy, thriving members of the community. Children participate in high-quality learning experiences and joyful, purposeful play to promote their academic, social-emotional, and physical development. The early childhood team engages with parents and caregivers to ensure that they have the resources and supports they need.

INSTRUCTIONAL QUALITY

This innovative initiative made possible by the Charles and Lynn Schusterman Family Philanthropies has allowed Tulsa Public Schools to strengthen the instructional capacity of school-based educators and central office staff while implementing new K-5 language arts curriculum. Additionally, through this investment, the Tulsa Teacher Corps program improved professional development experience in alignment with the district's instructional vision.
