

LaVaughn enjoyed teaching wherever Creighton's job took them, and during their time in Tulsa, she was a substitute teacher before becoming an English teacher at Lewis and Clark Junior High (now an elementary school). Creighton and LaVaughn were married for 72 years and raised three children Craig, Keith, and Ann Marie. They were known for their generosity, kindness, discipline, and appreciation for education.



LENDHEALTH SOORDINATOR

This position, supported by George Kaiser Family Foundation, provides comprehensive and integrative support for the district-wide health education for our students, as well as spearheads child abuse reporting and prevention. They and their team ensure alignment with the State Health Education Act. Their work cultivates a safe and inclusive educational environment, increases students' personal health and wellness, and creates empathy towards other students' wellness. The Lead Health Coordinator also manages and coordinates, in partnership with community partners, the implementation of Positive Prevention PLUS Health Education in 7th grade and 9th grade.

SUPERINTENDENT SCHOLARSHIP

Supported by Sodexo, 10 seniors receive the Superintendent Scholarship. These students are recognized at a banquet alongside their families and teachers for their hard work and perseverance.




EXPANDED LEARNING Monroe-McLain Pipeline

Supported by the Ed Darby Foundation, the expanded learning network provides experiential learning opportunities for elementary schools in the Monroe-McLain feeder pattern. Offering programs before, during, and after school, as well as during breaks and summer, staff collaborate with the community to deliver high-quality activities to support learning and address students' unique needs.



CHOICE NEIGHBORHOODS

The Choice Neighborhoods Initiative improves affordable housing in the Eugene Field community and offers services to enhance health, education, and economic outcomes. Our educational initiatives aim to retain students and families, support school staff during enrollment declines, and ensure Eugene Field remains a preferred choice for local families through a public Montessori educational model.



LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

This initiative supported in part by George Kaiser Family Foundation, provides high quality professional development and support. School and district leadership participated in professional learning opportunities to improve the capacity of staff members and increase the effectiveness of school leadership, as well as improving data utilization to increase student outcomes. 

"No one succeeds on their own. Everyone has that one person who impacted their life in a monumental way. That one person for me was Mr. Howard. At his nudging, I took a leap of faith and applied to Duke University, a decision that changed the trajectory of my life and helped a poor immigrant girl achieve the American dream.
